Services were expanded to support children as young as six, including the launch of an Emotionally Based School Non Attendance (EBSNA) service and tailored support for neurodiverse children and young people.

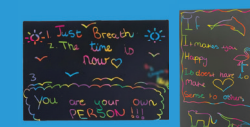
